We welcome applications from a scholar of any period who can teach Dante, engaging with broader global and transhistorical issues. We are especially interested in a researcher and teacher who can put the Italian tradition in dialogue with other literary and cultural traditions, or other disciplines (such as art history, media studies, philosophy, film studies).

Candidates will be expected to teach courses at both the graduate and undergraduate levels. Native or near native fluency in Italian and English is required; fluency in one or more additional languages is preferred. Candidates are expected to have the Ph.D. in hand by the appointment start date (September 1, 2024) and must demonstrate a distinguished record of scholarly publication as well as excellence in teaching.

Candidates should submit:

- a cover letter
- curriculum vitae
- three confidential letters of recommendation
- a teaching statement (that may include a diversity statement; no more than two pages)
- a brief statement of research interests (no more than three pages)
- teaching evaluations (if available).

Finalists will be asked to submit a writing sample. For full consideration, please submit application materials by November 1, 2023.
